Legislative Spotlight: SB 790 - Passed!

SB 790: Wildlife Protection and Movement Act

A few months ago, we wrote to you with our support of legislation that would encourage more connectivity projects throughout the state. Laguna Greenbelt, Inc. and its statewide-coalition partners are now pleased to announce that SB790 passed through both houses of California State Legislature, and is awaiting Governor Gavin Newsom's Signature. The governor has until October 10, 2021 to approve.

Why the bill is important:

- SB 790 encourages Caltrans to implement wildlife crossing projects such as bridges, underpasses, and fencing that prevent animals from being killed and humans from being injured by vehicle-wildlife collisions.
- Not only saves individual animals, but also promotes the health of the entire species
 because it gives animals like mountain lion access to potential mates and prevents
 isolated islands that force inbreeding. It also allows animals to access higher altitudes
 and cooler habitat, which scientists say is essential to species' ability to cope with
 climate change.

What the bill does:

• The bill gives the Department of Fish and Wildlife the authority to give Caltrans compensatory mitigation credits for doing crossing projects. The credits will be flexible enough that Caltrans will want to earn them.

Why the bill is needed:

• There are other state programs that can facilitate wildlife crossing projects, but they have some important limitations. The intent of the bill is not to replace these tools, but

to give the departments another option to facilitate corridors.

• Overall, this mitigation credit will help facilitate wildlife crossings and protect biodiversity of species.

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
