



Additional images from scientists, photographers, and other nature lovers are also displayed from other camera traps.

Camera traps are not traps at all, but devices that use motion- or heat-detecting sensors to snap photos as animals run, jump, or fly by—not unlike a hidden camera on a roller coaster. The photos provide a rare glimpse into unseen activities of local wildlife and clues that help us protect them.

The exhibit is part of the Museum's strategic plan to forefront conservation science and inspires people about the biodiversity of our binational region. Presented in English and Spanish, it will remain on view for close to two years.

Members of the Laguna Greenbelt, Inc. Board of Directors were recently guided through segments of the Irvine-Laguna Wildlife Corridor project constructed by FivePoint as part of their Great Park Neighborhoods development. Progress has been impressive, with construction on schedule to complete the Wildlife Corridor portion north of the I-5 freeway prior to 2026.

Segments of the Wildlife Corridor north of Barranca Parkway have been planted and are potential healthy habitats for native wildlife species. South of the intersection at Alton Parkway and Muirlands Boulevard an impressive underpass has been constructed to
