SPRINGTIME IN CA

The annual practice of daylight savings is a reminder that our days get longer and that spring is on its way. As our wet winter weather turns into less frequent storms and longer periods of sunshine, we see our native flowers bloom.

Perennials like our state flower, the Golden Poppy



(Eschscholzia californica), emerge in droves, blanketing hillsides bordering our cities. The traditionally subdued colors of our coastal sage scrub are illuminated by patches of orange, yellow, pink, and purple.

Native pollinators
such as the Crotch
bumble bee (Bombus
crotchii) and Anna's
hummingbird
(Calypte anna) thrive

on the plentiful options of nectar. The influx of resources reaches all parts of the food web, attracting small and large wildlife. Birds like the White-tailed kite (Elanus leucurus) scour fields for their prey as rodents like the California vole (Microtus californicus) and reptiles such as the Orangethroated whiptail (Aspidoscelis hyperythrus) discretely scamper away from their burrows under the blooming brush. An afternoon breeze carries the smell of California sagebrush (Artemisia californica) into the air, reminding us of the unique and complex qualities of our native plant life that have adapted to the Californian Mediterranean climate.

Commuters and weekend road trip warriors longingly daydream about laying their heads in the lush fields as they combat traffic. Families and friends lucky enough to escape the hustle of society strap on their hiking shoes and prepare for a respectful hike through nature. Trailhead signage kindly reminds people to stay on designated paths and observe nature through a mindful eye and shiny camera lenses. Restoration volunteers help restore balance to habitats by removing invasive species to sustain our native flora and fauna populations. Families return to their busy lives and "Leave No Trace" behind...
